**HONOLULU --** Almost one year after canceling its international convention in Honolulu due to the COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic, Rotary announced it will hold its annual gathering in Honolulu for the membership service organization's 118th convention on June 5-9, 2027.

"Beyond the incredible economic impact this convention will have, the people of Hawai'i will be inspired by the humanitarian causes of Rotary International, to include: promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, saving mothers and children, supporting education, growing local economies and protecting the environment," said John De Fries, President and CEO, Hawaii Tourism Authority.

The Rotary Club of Honolulu, chartered in 1915, is Rotary's first club in Honolulu. Today, there are more than 1,470 Rotary members who belong to over 45 clubs across Hawai'i taking action on important local issues including drowning prevention, creating green space in Waikiki and helping homeless people receive medical care.

Rotary strongly supports education by annually awarding student scholarships, sponsoring BHHS sophomores to attend the Rotary Youth Leadership Training Camp. and support of the Community Kitchen address local hunger needs.

Rotary also supports the schools through the Sole Mates program which provides funds each year in shoe vouchers for needy students, sponsoring the BHHS Interact program which helps students pursue service projects, offering 3rd grade water safety classes, and furnishing free dictionaries each year to all 3rd grade students.

#### ROTARY AND COMMUNITY STOCK JACK'S CUPBOARD

BROOKINGS – The Brookings Rotary Club surpassed its goal of 2,021 donations as part of last week's "Stock Jack's Cupboard" service project.

Jack's Cupboard is a free on-campus pantry resource for SDSU students who are experiencing food insecurity.

Rotarians collected non-perishable food and toiletry items for a week at the drop-off location at Dacotah Bank, culminating with car-side pickup on Tuesday, Feb. 16. This effort garnered about 600 items, which were delivered by Rotarians to the Cupboard the next day. Then, with monetary donations made by club and community members, Rotarians shopped at Hy-Vee for the remaining items to help them reach their goal, delivering the remaining items to the Cupboard on Friday. Cupboard volunteers and SDSU students Erica Koster and Kendra Eichten assisted with the unloading.

"Thanks to the community for its support of this project," said Rotary Club President Don Norton. "Once again, Brookings area residents have come through to help Rotary provide 'Service Above Self.' "Norton noted the register receipt from Hy-Vee was 20 feet long.

"We are very grateful for the support and generosity of Hy-Vee, and especially to management staff Nathan and the cashier and bagging employees, who helped us shop for five cartsful of items!"

Norton also recognized the help of the Brookings *Register* and radio station KBRK for their help in informing the public about the project.
